

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# From the Educational Officer LT/C ARTHUR DODD, SN

USPS has announced that, since there is a full course *Radar for Boaters*, the *Marine Radar* seminar has been discontinued.

The November Public Boating Class will be given November 6, 7 & 8 at the North Palm Beach Library. The December Public Boating Class was

cancelled due to the numerous holidays and disappointing past attendance.

Marine Electronics, with Lt Larry Rudner, SN instructing, is currently underway with 5 students.

Piloting, with Lt Mike Galvin, SN instructing, is currently underway with 1 student.

The next classes to start are:

Marine Communications, 3 December (please register by 19 November). This is an in-depth (not literally) review of those communications systems available to the recreational boater. Included are: radio history, radio spectrum, radio circuits, Global Maritime Distress and Safety System (GMDSS), FCC Rules and Regulations for radiotelephone operating procedures (both voice and digital messaging), High Seas radio (MF/HF and satellite communications), and other systems such as FRS/GMRS walkie-talkies. That said, it's likely that this course will be postponed until Spring of 2019 due to a lack of an instructor. If you have an interest and experience in radio systems and would like to try teaching, please let me know. I can guarantee you will get the same pay I get.

Seamanship, 10 December, taught by P/C Rick Wood, SN (please register by 26 November). This is the first course usually taken after the Basic Boating course. It includes such topics as the construction and functioning of a boat, the skipper's responsibilities (usually not including marriages), preparing the boat for use, handling and maneu-

vering a vessel under various conditions, rules of the road, anchoring, emergencies, and marlinespike/basic knots. Typically, this class includes on-the-water training on *Commander One*. Note that USPS is changing this course to a new name, 'Boat Handling', with a new seminar-based format. USPS has implemented a pilot program for this until mid-December.

Advanced Piloting, 12 December with Instructor Lt Tom Collins, SN (please register by 28 November). Advanced Piloting builds on the skills learned in Piloting and continues to build coastal and inland navigation skills. Challenging conditions such as unfamiliar waters, limited visibility, and extended cruises are added. GPS is used as the primary navigation tool while adding radar, chart plotters depth sounders, autopilots, laptop computers, and other topics.

Speaking of classes. There have been some cases where a student just shows up for a class without previously notifying the instructor. This is a problem because we do not usually have a large stock of student manuals, plus the class may have been cancelled (for lack of students or other reasons) prior to the first class. It usually takes about two weeks to receive manuals once ordered. I am asking that anyone contemplating taking a class, please contact the instructor at least two weeks prior to the first scheduled class.



## Larry Rudner, SN

Larry is the first to claim that joining the Squadron changed the direction of his life. He was born in Rochester NY, 1939, where he remained until high school graduation in 1957. From high school it was on to Purdue, a degree in electrical engineering and meeting his future bride, Marlene.


Larry was not a lover of Rochester, or more particularly, its winters. In his own words, "After graduation I went home, packed up my worldly possessions, and headed west for California and a job with Rocketdyne."

How many of us have worked in a situation where the final product is something that will change history? Rocketdyne was the main contractor the Apollo rockets to be used in the 'Race to the Moon' initiated by President Kennedy. Larry was a key participant in the design program. The rocket engines were capable of producing one and a half million pounds of thrust (about 50 million horsepower). Nothing of this magnitude had ever been conceived before. His responsibility was to design a



critical part of the fuel system. We were reminded that in those says no computers were available. All his work was done using a Marchant mechanical calculator which some of our readers may remember. Playing down his important role, Larry seemed more amused by his meeting with Werner Von Braun. They accidentally bumped into each other in the doorway!

We should note that he and Marlene tied the knot on the West



Coast—the beginning of, currently, almost 68 years of married life. Marlene was to play an important role in Larry's ultimate career.

In 1965 a decision was made to escape from the uncertainties of government contract work. He accepted a position with RCA in Memphis. From rocket motor design he moved to designing television sets (an engineer is an engineer!) This came to an

end when production was moved to Taiwan.

For a short time afterwards Larry, having obtained his masters degree, taught electronics at a technical institute, but his life was soon to take an unexpected turn. While visiting his parents who were living on Singer Island, he happened to see an ad in the newspaper by Pratt & Whitney, for an Engineering Supervisor.

Almost as an afterthought, he sent in his resume. To his surprise, a job offer quickly followed and a 19year career with the famed aero engine maker began.

During this time, Larry joined the squadron and quickly applied his engineering mind to the successful completion of all courses leading to Senior Navigator plus teaching engine maintenance and marine electronics.



His education included celestial navigation, and a long latent fascination (back to age 10) with astronomy was revived. He was encouraged by his friend and mentor Joe Rawlings. The two of them would spend hours studying the night sky, some of the

time at sea where they could enjoy a 360 degree horizon unrestricted by man-made light pollution.

Meanwhile Larry retired from Pratt & Whitney at age 58 and was able to devote more time to his interests—Squadron, his 23' Chris Craft, fishing, and stargazing. No doubt, of course, Marlene and the family were also beneficiaries of this newly acquired leisure. One of the rewards of retirement was the ability to take cruises. Larry, constantly imagining he was Captain Cook, Magellan et al could be regularly seen on deck practicing with his sextant. Interested fellow passengers had plenty of questions,

and on one occasion he was asked by the Recreation Officer if he would give a short lecture on the art of navigating using sun and stars. The new career was born!

Larry, buoyed by the enthusiasm his talk (followed by requested repeats) seemed to generate, decided to investigate what it would take to have a regular gig as a lecturer on cruise ships. Agents told him that he must expand his repertoire to include other subjects, especially the voyages of great seafaring explorers and their relevance to the history of the cruise ship's passage and ports of call. Painstakingly over time, he and Marlene have put together a portfolio of about forty lectures. Over 2000 hours of research were needed for some of the more detailed ones. Marlene operates the visual portions of the presentations.

Larry and Marlene have spent as much as 270 days a year at sea with various cruise lines. They have, for example, crossed every ocean, 'sailed' the Panama Canal 51 times, rounded Cape Horn 19 times, and visited countless ports around the globe. Their reputation brings new offers almost daily, but now they tend to choose only the best opportunities e.g. super luxury lines such as Regent and Silver Seas. They have earned their spurs.

"What a wonderful, interesting life you lead", we remarked at the end of our interview. "Never be envious of others," Marlene correctly responded. "Why not?" we thought as visions of luxurious life aboard ships floated before us!

Larry doubts if any of our members can point to the Squadron as being such a provider of life-changing experience as the one he has enjoyed. We cannot disagree. If you do, let us know—you'll be the subject of our next mini biography.

Bud Greene is a real local boy. The Greene family





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If you're a fisherman in southeast Florida, north of Miami, we'd wager that you've bought from, or at lest heard of, Lott Brothers. Their reputation as the place to go for the smallest hooks to beautiful custom-made rods is enviable.

Walking into the Northlake Blvd. store is like entering the Aladdin's cave of fishing supplies. Even for the non-fishing addict, one cannot help but be amazed at the proliferation of 'stuff for every angling need - plus advice'. Want to know what kind of lure might attract tarpon in Lake Worth? An employee or a



Lott brother will have the answer.

It all began in Baldwin, smallcommunity on south shore of Long Island. The father and uncle of current owners opened a bait, tackle, and custom rod business in 1941. It was successful


and counted among its clients some of the well-known sports stars of the day. Tragically their uncle died in 1959 of a sudden heart attack while visiting his parents, who owned a home in West Palm Beach.

In 1962 George Sr. decided to sell and re-open the business in Palm Beach County. He bought the site on Northlake for \$43,000. Then 47 years ago, the road was two lanes boasting a total of 4 retail stores. Times were hard and not helped when the purchaser of the Baldwin business reneged on his debt to the new owner of Lott Bros., Florida.

George Jr. and John both worked in the store as kids before college. Their lives changed abruptly when father died unexpectedly in 1972. The boys had no choice but to become full-time owner-employees. They were helped by a 'handshake' loan from 1st American Bank which may well have saved the whole enterprise.

As the local population grew, so did the business. Various endeavors have come and gone including boat rentals, sales, engine repairs, gas sales, hauling, and hull cleaning, but the core has remained—bait, tackle, ice, and custom rods. Lott Bros. is the biggest seller of bait from Miami north to the Treasure Coast. A good average is 1-1/4 tons per week!

When asked, John said what he valued most of their contributions to the community is the successful careers that so many of their young part-time employees have gone on to fulfill. Many doctors, lawyers and engineers were provided with solid grounding in the real world during their early tenure at Lott Bros..




The rebuilding of the Juno Beach Pier was next on John's list of contributions. Its destruction in 1984 removed one of the most popular fishing spots in the county. George and John's interest in the reconstruction was sparked by the number of customers, especially kids asking, "Where can we go catch some fish?" The Lott bothers took up the cause and, after initially being rejected by the County, collected 6,000 signatures on a petition to construct a new pier. With the help of others and, particularly Commissioner Karen Marcus, the \$1.3 million structure was opened in 1999. On the first day, a lucky angler hooked and released a

sailfish. The successes continue.

What does the future hold for the Lott Bros.? It's somewhat uncertain. The upcoming generation is pursuing other careers. George and John are approaching retirement age and the responsibility of running a business that's open 88 hours a week, 364 days per year does not diminish. We can be sure of one thing—as long as the name on the shingle is Lott Bros., the quality and service will remain the same excellent standard we've all come to know and respect.
