

A Captain's meeting before an event is important to ensure raft-up procedures do not damage anyone's boat. Captains' attendance is mandatory.































#### Excerpt from an article on BoatSafe.com

#### Capt. Matt,

I think the course is great! I really enjoyed it - in fact, I'm going to recommend it to the people I most often take out on my boat in the summer, because I think it's really important for the crew to be informed as to what to do if the captain becomes incapacitated, or falls overboard! Below is a tragedy that was related to me.

#### Janice

We had a horrible, but preventable tragedy this past summer in the Boston area....on a beautiful July afternoon two guys went sailing off Boston Light in a stiff breeze - their first mistake: not listening to, or ignoring the weather forecast. A lot of other people did the same thing, but were lucky - these guys were not.

The sky turned black, the wind picked up to 60 knots, and the seas grew to 10-12 feet, as severe thunderstorms blew in. In minutes, there were a half-dozen or so boats on the rocks, and one that had capsized with 2 adults and 6 children aboard! (they were all rescued, thankfully.) I got this info from an eyewitness who himself was out sailing, and told me that in 30 years of being on the water he has never been so scared in his life!

The captain of the sailboat I was referring to was knocked overboard by the boom while he was frantically trying to get the sails down. HE DROWNED in FULL VIEW OF **LAND** and a whole bunch of other boats who didn't know what was happening to him because they were too preoccupied with their own critical situations. The man left on board did not even know how to use the radio! When he finally figured it out, he could not tell the Coast Guard where he was located! He was from out of town, so he couldn't even give them a dead reckoning - the ultimate irony is - the local Coast Guard station was less than 1/2 mile away! But the guy didn't know it 'cause he wasn't familiar with the area. It was very frustrating for both him and the Coast Guard; by the time they got to him it was too late for the captain. He drowned because the only crew on board DID NOT KNOW WHAT TO DO!

A very tragic story, and it never should have hap-



pened! Anyway, thanks course and all the neat have it in my 'Favorite file, and I'm going there



for the info - I Places' now!

- Go over where the life jackets are located so that if the captain gives the order for everyone to don them, people aren't wasting precious time tripping over each and tearing things apart trying to find them! It's amazing how many boats have them tucked away somewhere out of sight, and the majority of guests/crew have no idea where to find them. By the way, the part of the USCG requirement concerning PFD's states that they must be readily accessible. That does not mean in the storage compartment in the V-berth under two cases of your favorite beverage.
- Point out the fire extinguisher locations and instruct passengers/crew how to use them.
- Conduct a demonstration on how to use the VHF radio. Discuss which channel in your area is the emergency channel, and how to pinpoint your location on the GPS (if you have one), in order to give it to the emergency personnel.
- If something goes wrong and the captain hasn't ordered you to do anything, GET OUT OF THE WAY! It's amazing how many people just stand there dumfounded in the middle of chaos it drives me nuts! We lost an engine in a 30 knot wind on the Charles River on the 4th of July where there were literally thousands of boats anchored and rafted all around us, and within seconds we were in extreme danger of a collision. We were trying to retrieve a tow line from a fellow boater, and my landlubber brother sat in a chair right in the middle of the back deck (we were on a 32-footer with about 10 people on board, and I was first mate) after I tripped over him and his chair for the third time, I yelled at him to get out of the way go into the cabin and stay there! He was hurt, of course, and took it personally, but I tried to explain to him later that on a boat in a critical situation, if you are not part of the solution, you are part of the problem! GET OUT OF THE WAY! (We didn't collide, but it was very close, and everyone was really stressed out for a while afterward).
- It may also be a good idea to just show people where some basic equipment is located life ring, boat hooks, gaffs, lines, first aid kit, etc., just in case they are asked to retrieve them in a hurry. Also, I always tell people where the sharpest knife on board is located, just in case it's needed in a hurry, to cut a line. Maybe it would be a good idea to compose a "Crew Test" for those people who don't own their own boat, but spend a lot of time on friends' boats! I think your web site is great the graphics are fantastic, and the pages move quickly. The information is wonderful, and oh I love the way the knots tie and untie themselves! It's the first time I finally figured out how to tie a correct bowline, seeing it done that way (yeah, I know, it's not that hard, but it's been sort of a mental block with me something like when I was trying to understand college algebra!)!





#### Operations Training: STF/C Mary Dodd, SN

This month my article is about the duties of the Auditing Committee. The Auditing committee is also one of three (3) General Committees in a squadron. The members are elected and the Commander is not a member of the Committee.

As per section 5.7 of our Squadron's Bylaws, the Auditing Committee, consists of a chairman

and two (2) other members, one of whom shall be elected by the active members at the annual meeting each year for a term of three (3) years.

#### What Good Are Boat Brokers?

#### The Role of a Yacht Broker for the Buyer:

Yacht Brokers are consultants who can be an extremely helpful resource when buying your next boat. Their goal is to protect your interests throughout the purchasing process, from the initial consult to taking delivery of your vessel.

If you are looking to buy a boat, there are many resources available to search online, such as YachtWorld.com or BoatTrader.com, which will put you in contact directly with the listing broker. However, a more rewarding option is to select a yacht broker initially to discuss the type of boat you are looking for. They will help narrow down the type of boat that will best meet your needs. They will facilitate the search online as well as communicate with other brokers on your behalf. They can also access private information about a boat's history through internal industry resources.

An important point to note is that there is no cost or risk involved in hiring a broker as the the seller pays for the commission. Because there is no charge for their service, it is a much better strategy than searching on your own.

### How a Yacht Broker will assist you in buying a boat:

The Initial Consult – A professional yacht broker working on your behalf will listen

closely to your wants and needs. Many are life-long boaters with a wealth of knowledge about different boat types and their offerings. They will address important questions to help you determine if the type of boat you have in mind is right for you and if it represents good value.

**The Search:** After this meeting, your broker will begin narrowing down the boats matching your criteria that are currently on (and off) the market. Using industry resources, they can find out the history of the vessel, how long it has been on the market, and the motivation of the current owner. Although some of this information is available online, your professional yacht broker has an



intimate knowledge of current market conditions, a familiarity with similar boats, information on recent sale prices and time on the market through www.soldboats.com (an industry resource not available to the public). Section 6.10 of our squadron bylaws states: "The Auditing Committee shall examine all records of the treasurer as of the last day of the squadron fiscal year and submit a report of its findings for action by a membership meeting not more than 60 days after the end of the fiscal year. An additional audit shall be performed and reported to the membership within 60 days should a different individual assume the office of treasurer prior to the end of the fiscal year."

This is a good committee for those who are a detail people and like math.

This information comes from Palm Beach Sail and Power Squadron Bylaws. Next month we will start talking about the appointed committees in each department.

#### For no cost!

#### Arranging Marine Finance and Marine Insurance: You

may want to pre-qualify for a boat loan before you shop. This will give you some extra leverage and breathing room when you're negotiating prices. Your broker will be able to offer a variety of trusted marine lenders.



Making an Offer on a Pre-Owned Boat: A professional broker can help you decide on a realistic offer that increases the chances of buying a vessel for a fair and reasonable price, and with the necessary elements in place to protect your interests. Your broker prepares the offer for

> your signature, stating the terms of the sale and the obligations that you and the seller have agreed to. A timeline for these obligations to be fulfilled is also put in place. You then make a good-faith deposit on the boat, which is placed in your broker's client account, subject to a satisfactory sea trial and survey.

> **Paperwork :** Brokers are familiar with all the paperwork needed to check whether the vessel has a clean and unencumbered title, including the paper trail to show payment of VAT where ap-


propriate, and will check that there is no outstanding marine mortgage secured on the boat.

Sea Trial and Survey – The buyer of a used vessel will usually request to have a sea trial and marine survey carried out. Buyers pay for the survey and for hauling the boat out of the water for inspection. Your broker will attend the sea trial and survey to help you determine how to address the surveyor's recommendations. They will help put into context any survey issues as well as estimate the time and costs associated with fixing them. They can also suggest trusted professionals to carry out any maintenance needed.

The Art of Negotiating The Deal: Your broker can use their position as an intermediary to help negotiations between the buyer and seller move to a successful conclusion, even in the event of unforeseen problems.

Safeguard Funds – Your broker should use a client account for your funds, and ensure that on completion of the purchase, any existing loan or other encumbrances are paid off. This safeguard is of critical importance to the buyer and seller, and can be a potentially serious hazard in a private transaction that does not involve a broker.
