out on the water, especially here in South Florida.



NEW: FL, Jupiter Sound Hazard:

NEW: FL, Jupiter Sound Hazard:

The U.S. Coast Guard received a report that Jupiter Sound Light 47 (LLNR 46175) was damaged by a barge. The steel pile is leaning and the light is extinguished. Chart 11472 (7th District LNM Week 41/2019)

NEW: FL, Hillsboro Inlet Entrance Light to be Extinguished:

Hillsboro Inlet Entrance Light (LLNR 775) will be extinguished due to scheduled maintenance beginning October 20, 2019 until approximately November 4, 2019. Chart 11466 (7th District LNM Week 40/2019)

NEW: FL, Dredging Ops, Lake Worth Inlet:

Cashman Dredging will commence dredging operations on or about October 13, 2019 in Palm Beach Harbor, Palm Beach County, Florida. Operations will be conducted within the Federal Navigation Channel encompassing the Palm Beach Entrance Channel. The project will involve the Trailing Suction Hopper Dredge ATCHAFALAYA removing shoaled material from the Federal Channel and then transitioning to a near shore disposal area south of the Entrance Channel. The survey vessel SURVEY 2 and other support vessels will support the dredge, and all vessels will monitor VHF channels 16, 13, 12, and use 74 as the working channel. Mariners are urged to transit at their slowest safe speed to minimize wake and proceed with caution after passing arrangements have been made. The dredge will operate 7 days a week, 24 hours a day. The work is scheduled to be completed on or about October 31, 2019. For further information, contact the Project Manager, Jack Rush at (617) 766-3616. Chart 11472 (*7th District LNM Week 41/2019*)

Lockheed Martin Palm Beach will conduct offshore testing from October 7 through November 29, 2019 with a manned submersible vehicle piloted by two personnel. The submersible will transit on the surface from Lockheed Martin facility west of Peanut Island, south on the AICW to the Port of Palm Beach Turning Basin. From the Turning Basin the submersible will be towed by a RHIB out the Lake Worth Inlet then south to the operational area. Testing will occur from Lake Worth Inlet south to Boynton Inlet from near shore up to 10 miles offshore. Testing may occur 24 hours daily, weekdays only. During this time the submersible will be accompanied by 2 surface RHIBs displaying amber flashing lights. Dive operations with scuba divers in the water may occur anytime during the testing and RHIBs will display diver down flags in the vicinity of scuba divers. RHIBs will be monitoring VHF ch16. Mariners are advised to transit the area with caution and maintain 200 yard clearance from RHIBs and dive balls. (*7th District LNM Week 39/2019*)





From the Educational Officer LT/C ARTHUR DODD, SN

It looks as though people don't want to take the ABC3 basic boating course; or, at least, not if it isn't free. The September class had 2 students. The October 15th class at the North Palm Beach Library had no students signed up on 10/10; two signed up on 10/11. I cancelled the class. Usually, our classes at the North

Palm Beach Library attract over 20 students. Not so this time.

The last ABC3 class this year will be November 1, 4, 6 & 8: 7 – 9:30 PM at HQ; D/C Ed Hoover, AP instructing with Lt John Findlay, AP assisting.

I have been working on next year's class schedule. Due to the lack of attendance this year, I am scheduling ABC3 classes every other month.

Advanced/Elective Classes:

Seamanship, taught by P/C Rick Wood, JN: exams have been taken and submitted to National. Results have not yet been received.

Marine Electrical Systems, taught by Lt Larry Rudner, SN, started September 12 with 2 students and continues.

Piloting, taught by Lt Mike Galvin, SN, started September 23 with 5 students.

Seamanship, taught by P/C Rick Wood, JN, is scheduled to start December 2.

Advanced Piloting: if there is sufficient interest, we will schedule an AP class. Please contact me if you are interested in attending.

There are two educational awards that mark milestones in a member's educational progress in the USPS:

The National USPS Educational Proficiency Award: This is awarded to members who successfully complete Seamanship, Piloting, Advanced Piloting, and any three elective courses.



The National USPS Educational Achievement Award: This award is earned by successfully completing ALL courses offered at the time of a member's completion of their final course. This is signified by adding "SN" (Senior Navigator) as the grade after a member's name.



Pop quiz answer: It means the power boat is operating with the engine in reverse. This signal is typically given by the large ships as they leave the dock.

TIPS TO MAKE BOATING LESS "FUELISH"

At \$4.00 per gallon, many boaters are finding it much too costly to enjoy a day on the water. At two hours each way, a run to a nice marina restaurant can cost a twin engine boater upwards of \$500.00. That makes for one very expensive hamburger. Following are ten helpful tips that will help you increase your fuel economy, save a few dollars, and maybe increase the time you can afford to be on the water. 1. If you keep the boat on a lift, make certain your hull is clean and well waxed. If you keep your boat in the water, be sure to maintain a good coat of bottom paint. A slippery boat has less drag. 2. Proper size, pitch, and number of propeller blades are important. Select the optimal combination for your boat. Sacrificing a little top end speed can give you a 10% increase in fuel economy. 3. Nicks, dings, or bends in a propeller can increase fuel consumption by up to 15%. Check your prop regularly. 4. Clean your carburetor, injectors, and flame arrestor to maximize air fuel blend and optimal performance. Commercial gasoline additives are fine to clean your fuel systems and be sure to use a non flammable cleaner on the flame arrestor. 5. Remove all unnecessary weight to minimize the amount of hull being pushed through the water. Every pound of weight creates the need for one more pound of displacement. 6. Trim your tabs, outboards, and stern drives to keep your bow up and out of the water to minimize drag. 7. Whenever

conditions allow, keep the boat up on plane. (Be certain to adhere to all speed and wildlife control zones). 8. Conduct some control runs and create an RPM vs. fuel consumption curve. This will help you pick your optimum cruising speed. Pick your boating days with care. Rough seas and headwinds can increase your fuel economy by over 25%. 10. Lastly, but most importantly, tell your friends the days of the free boat trips are over. At \$4.00 per gallon it isn't unreasonable to tell guests up front the approximate cost of the days gas bill and that "we will be splitting the cost amongst us". Just do so up front so they have a chance to opt out of paying \$100.00 each for their burger. A Neat Ship is a Safe Ship

Improperly stowed gear can not only be unsightly, but can damage your equipment and become a tripping hazard or worse. It isn't fun to watch loose gear get caught in the wind and blown overboard. A cluttered deck is particularly dangerous in rough seas if loose gear is sliding around the deck.

I hate reaching for a line that is fouled into a tangled mess. If you don't have a line locker, it is easy to install a board with hooks on the inside of the gunwales to hang your coiled lines. Having those lines handy, life jackets at the ready, fire extinguishers mounted in a strategic spot, first aid kit close by in a dry location, and anchor line clear for instant use are all little things that can help a rapid response to a developing situation.

In the big picture of boating safety, properly stowed gear might seem a trivial issue, but I know of incidents that bring home its importance. In one case, a man and woman aboard a 40 foot pleasure craft were about to tow a smaller boat. While the woman was preparing the tow line, there was a slack length lying on the deck. She inadvertently stood amidst the loose line. As the towing boat started to move, this line coiled around her leg and lifted it into the air. This unfortunate deck hand took a severe fall and suffered an extreme injury. In another incident, three men were out for a day of fishing. At one point, they decided to move to another location. They pulled the anchor on board

and left it lying on the bow above anchor locker. As the boat came up on plane, it bounced over a wave and the anchor slipped unnoticed back into the water. As the line played out, the anchor temporarily set on something. When the force of the boat caused the anchor to release, it catapulted forward toward the boat, and sank the shank of the anchor into the back of the head of an unlucky fisherman.

Fortunately, the crew knew enough leave the anchor in the skull and radioed ahead. At the dock they were met by emergency medical teams and the injured man was airlifted to a hospital where the anchor was safely removed.

It is hard to imagine that these severe injuries would take place. Unfortunately, there are a myriad of potential accidents lurking amongst your poorly stowed equipment. Don't be the one to discover a new bizarre story. Keep your gear stowed safely! Remember the old saying; "A place for everything, and everything in its place."

- Local Customs & Irritation \$?



This year Palm Beach Sail and Power Squadron will be reaching a milestone; we will be celebrating our 75th anniversary. Because of this, I thought I would resurrect an article that was submitted in 2017 telling some interesting fun facts about our squadron and add a few new ones.

- The original name of the squadron was Palm Beach Power Squadron.
- The first meeting of the Palm Beach Power Squadron was held on 20 November 1944 and the first Bylaws were approved by the National Governing Board on 28 November 1944.
- Our first Squadron Commander was P/C Henry Gibson, JN who served from 1945-1946. (The names of all Palm Beach Squadron Commanders and the year they served can be found in our squadron's Roster.
- We are part of the United States Power Squadrons that has 356 squadrons, 32 Districts that includes all of the United States, Puerto Rico, St Thomas, and Japan
- We are members of District 8 which begins in Sebastian Florida and ends in Key West.
- Women were allowed to become active Member of the United States Power Squadrons® in 1982 and Palm Beach Power Squadron's first female Commander was P/ C Margaret Roselli, JN in 1993. That was also when Lunch Bunch became co-ed.
- We celebrated our 50th anniversary in 1994 and received permission from National to add a gold border to the Squadron Burgee. The white palm tree in red back-ground represents Palm Beach and the 8 stripe represents District 8.
- In the year 2000 our squadron's name was changed to Palm Beach Sail and Power Squadron.
- In addition to having the name Palm Beach Sail and Power Squadron, we are also known as the America's Boating Club of Palm Beach.
- Three members of our squadron have received the Charles Chapman Award for Outstanding Teacher of the Year from National; those members are P/Stf/C Joseph Rawlins, SN; P/C Hans Heynau, SN and P/R/C William Eldridge, SN

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


