The Meaning of a Merit Mark

The Merit Mark Committee has the honor, privilege, and responsibility of preparing merit mark recommendations for those Active and Family members who have made substantial efforts on behalf of our squadron during the calendar year 2017. In doing so, we are committed to maintaining the highest standards of this, our only reward, to those who have served so well in furthering USPS objectives.

A Merit Mark is awarded by the chief commander to USPS members who have made substantial personal efforts in furthering the interests, programs, and objectives of USPS, its districts, and squadrons. Members are limited to one merit mark per year. When a merit mark recommendation is approved, the chief commander issues a certificate of acknowledgement to the recipient, who is then entitled to proudly wear a special merit mark insignia on his or her USPS uniform.

After earning five Merit Marks, a member becomes known as a *Senior Member*, and upon earning 25 Merit Marks, the member is designated a *Life Member* and is exempt from paying dues.



I ask the questions to each of you. And, I ask you directly, what have you done to tell other boaters who we are and what we do?

I know this may be perceived as a harsh question. But, nonetheless a very important one. If you believe that we are an important benefit to the boating community then why aren't you talking about us.

I know many of you are already doing this and I thank you. I, also, know that many of you are not. What? Our Port Engine has Stopped?

Another story from my Coast Guard time in the Philippine Islands. In the 50's and 60's the U. S. Coast Guard operated five LORAN stations at strategic location around the Philippine's.

Our Air detachment at a Navy Amphibious Air Base on Sangley Point, around the bay from Manila, had just two Grumman Albatross Sea Planes. One was always in the nose hanger for routine maintenance while the other was flying.

We flew five days a week. So, we were at each LORAN station every week. Our job was to deliver food, movies and electronic supplies to these outlying, mostly isolated locations. Two were water landings and the other three were on grass strips. The grass strips were so short for a big lumbering sea plane to take off we had to use JATO bottles (one on each side of the fuselage) to get up and airborne fast. JATO stands for "Jet Assist Take Off". They were about the size of a 50 gallon drum and they attached the back of the plane just below the stabilizers. The pilot had a button he pushed to engage the JATO bottles. When we got rudder control with our engine speed, the JATO's were started up and the whole plane shuttered and took off like a bat out of hell. We were airborne in just a few seconds.

So, now to my story.

One day on the way back to our base from Catalan Island we were at 10,000 feet in a bad cloud cover when our port engine just stopped running. Without any warning, the engine just shut down. The pilot, Lt Russell, had to feather that engine's prop until we could figure out what happened. We were flying as high as we could (without oxygen) so that we would clear the mountain range on the central part of Luzon. As the radioman, the pilot told me to go back and get on the radar and direct us to get over the coast line, away from the mountains. Remember we were in a dark thick cloud cover. The starboard engine was pushed up to max throttle and the co-pilot had to stand on the rudder to keep us flying sorta straight. We were sacrificing fuel to maintain altitude. After about two hours we were just off the coast of Manila and could see to land when we descended to 2,000 feet. On the way we tried to restart the engine and it would run for a few seconds then shut down again. We came in on one engine (just like on the training flights we had to perform periodically).

No problem. The co-pilot, Lt Greene, was just about worn out from holding the rudder over by standing on the foot controls. Once on the ground our chief mechanic came out and studied the situation for a couple of minutes and said to his helper, (go get me a class jar). He went over to the port wheel well where the fuel drain cock was and drained out a jar of gas. When the bubbles settled down we saw what the problem was. The Port fuel tank was about half full of water. It seems we had a rain storm the night before and someone at the tank farm left the lid on the top of the tank truck open and rain water came in an mixed with fuel. When we called for fuel and gassed up the next morning we were unaware of this and took on contaminated fuel.

The big question I had was, "what if we had also sucked up some water in the starboard tank?". I bent over and kissed the concrete ground. A true story about the US Coast Guard.

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
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NOTICE OF ELECTION

NOTICE TO ALL ACTIVE MEMBERS: The election of officers for the 2018-2019 Bridge Year will be held at the Squadron's Annual Meeting beginning at 7:00 P.M. on Tuesday, **13 March**, at Sandpiper's Cove Restaurant & Bar.

What you Need to Know

The Squadron's affairs are managed by the Board of Directors (Bylaws § 6.7). The members of the Board of Directors are the Commander, Executive Officer, Educational Officer, Administrative Officer, Secretary and Treasurer (collectively the Bridge Officers), Members at Large, and the most recent past commander willing and able to serve (Bylaws § 5.4). The Board of Directors is elected by the active members at the Annual Meeting in March of each year and takes office at the Change of Watch Ceremony the following June (Bylaws § 5.2).

Pursuant to Bylaws section 6.8, the Nominating Committee prepares a slate of officers for elected positions, which it then sends to the Secretary at least 40 days prior to the Annual Meeting. The Secretary is required to send to each active member a copy of the Nominating Committee's slate of nominees together with a written notice of the annual meeting (Bylaws § 9.3). Publication of the Secretary's notice and the Nominating Committee's slate of nominees in this edition of the Afterdeck News satisfies the notice requirement contained in the Squadron's bylaws (Bylaw § 9.6).

There are two other ways in which officers may be nominated for election: (1) Nominees by Petition - Written petition signed by at least five active members in good standing and filed with the Secretary at least 15 days before the annual meeting (Bylaws § 11.1); (2) Nominees for Vacancies in Nominating Committee's Slate - If vacancies exist in the Nominating Committee's Slate of Nominees, nominations may be made from the floor by active members at the Annual Meeting (Bylaws § 11.4).

Election to an uncontested office may be effected by a supported motion and a ballot cast and recorded by the Secretary (Bylaws § 11.5.2). Election to a contested office shall be by secret ballot, unsigned and cast in person (Bylaws § 11.5.3). No active member shall be eligible for nomination without first signifying a willingness and ability to serve if elected (Bylaws § 11.4).





As February is the founding month of the United States Power Squadrons®, I thought it would be interesting to write about some fun facts about our squadron.



- •Roger Upton was a sailing member of the Boston Yacht Club but the idea of the new fangled powerboats captivated him and he installed a 20 horsepower convertible kerosene- gasoline engine on his ketch .
- •Roger Upton got together with other like-minded members and got permission of the Boston Yacht Club to start a club within a club to include the select group of gasoliners.
- On 2 February 1914, at the New York Yacht Club, the United States Power Squadrons® was established.



•The United States Power Squadrons is now over 100 years old.

From the Educational Officer Lt/C Arthur Dodd, SN

How important is boating education? In 2016, Florida led the nation in boating accidents with a total of 714 reportable accidents. The leading type of accident, was collision with another vessel, with a total of 181 (25%). There

were 56 fatal accidents resulting in 67 fatalities. 16 (29%) of the

fatal accidents, were falls overboard; this remains the leading cause of boating fatalities. The leading cause of death in fatal accidents was drowning, with 40 fatalities (60%). Alcohol or drug-use is reported to have played a role in 24% of boating fatalities. The 714 accidents resulted in 421 injuries. 70% of the operators involved in fatal accidents had NO formal boater education. What does this mean to us?

The USPS has been focused on boater education for decades. The result is that we have saved lives. Every student graduating from one of our classes has a significantly less chance of becoming a statistic. When someone asks you why they should take a boating class, tell them these facts. (Data from the FWC 2016 Boating Accidents Statistical Report.)

December, 2017, saw 3 courses wrap up: Seamanship (3 students passed: Judy Ballard, Joy Levin and Ivan Roman), Advanced Piloting (results not in yet) and Weather (4 students passed: Helene Hvizd, David Lee, Chuck Blair and John Findlay). Congratulations to all.

The Basic Boating Class given 6-7 January, had 7 students. All passed and 5 became new members of the Palm Beach Sail & Power Squadron.

January had 5 courses starting: Piloting, Jr. Navigation, Cruise Planning, Marine Electrical Systems and Sail.

In March, 2018, there are 2 courses scheduled: Engine Maintenance, and Instructor Development, with P/C Rick Wood, SN, instructing.

Duties include assisting the Squadron Educational Officer (SEO) in planning and running the Squadron education program. Requirements: the candidate should have attained at least an Educational Proficiency level (AP or higher with 3 electives).

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

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America's Waterway Watch

America's Waterway Watch is a public outreach program encouraging participants to simply report suspicious activity to the Coast Guard and/or other law enforcement agencies. Unlike some Neighborhood Watch programs, for example, you are not formally joining an organization -- there are no meetings, membership cards or membership requirements -- and you do not become an agent of the Coast Guard or any other law enforcement agency.

As a person who spends time on or near the water, YOU already know what is normal and what is not, and YOU are well suited to notice suspicious activities — activities possibly indicating threats to our nation's homeland security. As participant in America's Waterway Watch, we urge you to adopt a heightened sense of awareness toward unusual events or individuals you may encounter in or around ports, docks, marinas, riversides, beaches, or waterfront communities.

That being said, today's anti-terrorism environment is changing as evident of what has transpired recently. Our focus is on facilities, ports, waterways, infrastructure and shipping. We must be vigilant. If we are not then we are susceptible to attack. We need your help.

In 2016 the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) reported an increase in the amount of vessels stolen in the USA. Florida is ranked number one. The number is 5116 In case you were wondering. Which one of these can be used as a weapon? All 5116. Off the shelf technology has made it easier for those wishing to do us harm to carry out surveillance without alerting anyone to the activity.

We simply do not have the manpower to keep a constant eye. As with airplane pilots, most boaters have experience. Our approach is to use that knowledge and experience to our benefit. To solicit their eyes in helping us to determine things out of place or questionable activity. It maybe something as simple as somebody asking for the best fishing spot near a military base or a boat sitting directly under a bridge at night with no navigation lights on or a drone hovering over an oil transfer dock.

Recent actions have shown that the trend of people wishing to do us harm has moved from a larger cell down to a single person. This makes it even harder to detect. Even more is the need to keep our guard up. By enlisting help with American Waterway Watch adds another layer of security.

An added benefit is that areas that have fully embraced the American Waterways Watch have statistically seen a reduction in crime in those areas.

We have taken the approach to plaster American Waterways Watch all over social media, public presentations, signage, outreach and refocusing our air crews and boat crews to be alert for suspicious activities. This all gets vetted through the National Response Center at 877-24WATCH. It is up to you to report suspicious activity.



"WE SEE YOU"

There is no "one size fits all" approach that will serve in securing us from attack. We have over 12,000 miles of USA coast line. It requires continuous "out of the box thinking".

I would be more then happy to travel to you and meet when I return from sea and share ideas. In the meantime, if you have specific concerns or questions that must be addressed or if you would like literature then please contact me.
