Cold hard facts about our Club:


Our sing-along was pre-empted by our neighbor in his catamaran and a live band on board. They stopped at our dock for a while and entertained the neighborhood. What a hoot!

The Price of Quality

Ben Franklin once said "The bitterness of poor quality remains long after the sweetness of low price is forgotten." I think that most of us have learned that lesson the hard way, I

know I have. But recently, I had the opportunity to relearn that lesson, and once again, it was the hard way. Not that I'm cheap but some things just seem so over priced for what you get. This generally has me looking for alternatives or finding a way to prolong the life of a piece of equipment that is probably past its useful life. If you have a Yanmar diesel engine in your boat, you know what I'm talking about.

A couple of years ago the solenoid on my starter jammed up and kept the starter motor engaged after the engine had started. It took me a few minutes to figure out what was going on before I could shut off the power but by that time the starter motor had started to smoke. Knowing that the solenoid was shot and the starter motor was now suspect, it was time for a visit to Marine Pro in Cocoa for a new starter. You can imagine the look on my face when the parts guy said the OEM starter was just a tad over \$400! But for about a third of the price they had an aftermarket starter they could sell me. As I mentioned, not that I'm cheap but...

The first thing I noticed about the new starter was it wasn't quite as heavy as the original, not that weight is an indicator of quality but generally means the part is more robust. The second thing I noticed was it didn't seem to crank as hard as the old one but it did get the job done. However, after about a year, I noticed it was taking a little bit longer to get the engine fired up and the starter was starting to make some unhealthy noises. I started browsing the sailing forums to see what others recommended for replacement starters and saw a lot of complaints about aftermarket starters failing. A few folks talked about having good luck with Masco starters that are made in the USA. At about twice the price of the el cheapo import models, it was still a much lower cost than the Yanmar part. I ordered one online, then headed to the marina for an afternoon sail, or so I thought.

The engine cranked for a few seconds then made a horrible crunching noise! I could hear the starter motor spinning but not engaging the flywheel. Like Ralphie in A Christmas Story, I uttered an "Oh Fudge!" I pulled off the engine cover half expecting to find the starter in pieces but nothing was obviously wrong so I headed home to wait for the new starter to arrive.

It showed up a few days later and the difference in the design and construction was a noticeable improvement over the old one, not to mention it felt heftier. Grabbing the tool box and the new starter. I headed to the boat expecting about an hour's worth of work and then some sailing. Foolish me, you would think by now I would know better than to believe it would go as expected. When I removed the broken starter my heart sank, the cast aluminum nose cone was broken and a big piece was missing! That meant only one thing, the chunk of metal had fallen down inside the flywheel housing. I sat back in frustration and repeated the "Oh Fudge" along a few other choice words. In the back of my mind I knew I would have to pull out the transmission to get the missing piece but I was still in denial and spent a couple of hours devising ways to fish out the metal chunk but to no avail. I headed home to break out the Yanmar manual and the rum.

I discussed the problem with a mechanic buddy who offered to bring his endoscope to the boat to see if we could spot the elusive fragment. We managed to snake the probe down inside the housing and sure enough, found 2 pieces just under the flywheel. He confirmed what I already knew but didn't want to hear, the transmission would have to come out. He left the scope with me and once again I spent a couple of fruitless hours trying to retrieve the chunks. In the end, I finally bit the bullet and pulled out the transmission to remove the broken pieces, but that's another whole story in itself. As a lesson to myself, I've decided to mount the pieces of metal on a wooden plaque along with the words "The bitterness of poor quality..."
